## **PARTICIPANTS**

Sophia Wood is Designer/Creative Director at Studio Sophia Wood. Collaboration, education and interdisciplinary exchange. She is passionate about the importance of collaborations across disciplines, ages, borders, of the arts and science meeting, that contribute to empathy and understanding, and new experiences with knowledge that stays with us and make us feel and react.

Alexis Zapata is an Ecuadorian musician, conductor of traditional orchestras, educator, researcher, and composer. His published compositions include "Sinfonía Andina de los 7 Glaciares", "Bosque Sinfónico", and "Danzando con las Bacterias", among others. Alexis has received notable awards for his musical contributions.

Satya Sivaraman is a health communications consultant based in India but with work experience on projects in Southeast Asia and South America. He is currently a communication advisor with ReAct Asia-Pacific. His work has involved finding new ways of conceptualising the problem, audiences and understanding resistance in an anthropological and cultural context.

Mary Murray has worked for over 40 years in Australia, other countries and global arenas to develop and implement equitable and effective National Medicines Policies (NMP). She helped

organize the First Peoples Health Assembly of the Peoples Health Movement in 2000 in Bangladesh. In 2004 she completed a PhD in Cultural Psychology. From 2005 – 2015 she was global network coordinator for ReAct, based in Uppsala, Sweden. In 2015, she co-founded the International Society to Improve the Use of Medicines (ISIUM), serving as Board Chair until 2021. She is also an artist.

Arturo Quizhpe Peralta was former dean of the Faculty of Medical Sciences of the University of Cuenca, with postgraduate studies at the Federal University of Rio de Janeiro, Tel Aviv University and the University of London. Invited professor and lecturer at universities, academic institutions, and popular organizations in Latin America, Europe, Asia, and Africa. Author of numerous books, research and scientific articles published in various media, languages and countries. He has been involved in several movements promoting peoples' health. Director of ReAct Latin America

Silvana Figar, Physician from the University of Buenos Aires in 1993; Master in Epidemiology from the School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, London and doctoral student in Social Sciences at FLACSO. I currently coordinate the Epidemiology Section of the Medical Clinic Service and the Population Research Area of the Italian Hospital in Buenos Aires. Director of the Specialization Course in Epidemiology and recently of the Council of Epidemiology of the Argentine Society of Medicine to promote salutogenic networks.

Tatiana Souza de Camargo, Associate professor faculty of Education, Federal University of Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil. PPG Educação em Ciencias (PPGECI). Education Fellow. Planetary health Alliance, PHA - Harvard. Member of the Planetary Health Study Group Institute for Advanced Studies, IEA - USP.

She has written two bestselling books on glazes (Glazes for Australian Potters and More Glazes for Australian Potters), co-authored Handbook for Australian Potters, and has written numerous articles for Australian and International Ceramics journals on ceramic art practice, education and glaze technology.
